FLU VACCINATION CLINIC INFORMATION

In October we will be conducting our annual North and our West flu vaccination clinics. The West will have their flu clinic on Wednesday, October 16th, and North's will be on Wednesday, October 23rd. In preparation for these flu vaccination clinics, we'll be attaching the required VNA forms for both locations to the August 10th pay stubs. For those who are 65 and older, we do have flu shot forms for that age group available as well. That way the nurses will be sure that they have enough of those shots, so advance notification is required. The deadline for getting your flu shot forms in is Friday, September 27th. That is also the end of Lafayette's fiscal year, so both North's and West's forms will be due the same time. It gives everyone enough time to get those filled out. Don't forget to have it signed, and to attach a copy of your state ID and your insurance cards. Thanks in advance for everyone's cooperation.

WHAT PARAMEDICS WISH WE KNEW

Jancee Dunn of the New York Times wrote a great article on July 11, 2024, on this subject. I am convinced to respond to it. I am curious if you will feel the same way. You can seek out the article yourself, but I am going to share those things which I can and likely will do in responding to it.

Paramedics respond to emergencies that are typically chaotic. They need to gather information quickly, and it would behoove us to have it ready. Elizabeth DiRocco, a Los Angeles County paramedic, states that brain damage can occur in as little as five minutes if it is deprived of oxygen. Strokes and heart attacks are a tremendous threat with that scenario.

It would be of tremendous benefit if we had certain details already written out: Present health issues, medicines we are presently taking and even our blood type. Having this information available on your refrigerator and perhaps in your wallet could be lifesaving. Office supply stores have small and large self-laminating products to protect the info.

I had what is called a 3rd degree heart block 7 weeks ago, and fortunately my lovely wife was nearby. Paramedics responded quickly to the situation, and I'm feeling pretty good. Had she not been there though, I am not sure I could have been of much help to those folks. (You may begin with the damaged brain jokes now.) What do you say, my friends? Let us try this.

SAFETY IS NO ACCIDENT! - **MORE LATER!**

Editor's Note: The Editor can corroborate Mr. Heitert's thoughts about medical safety. Having been a caretaker of a parent who had several life-threatening illnesses, we used to average an ER visit a month that was related to their health issues. We learned to carry a hard copy of their medications, and a listing of their illnesses and operations, complete with the year they occurred. We also included their insurance information, and it was carried it in my wallet should we need it. Many times we heard how great the paramedics, doctors and nurses thought it was to have that information readily available. There are also medical alert bracelets available that tie people's medical history into a much larger health info network, where they store that history. It makes everything a lot easier when you have complete information, and they can then concentrate on getting you better.


